



Egyptian Electric lands \$360,000 loan for Degognia-Fountain Bluff Levee and Drainage District

Areas in Jackson County will soon have increased protection from flooding thanks to Egyptian Electric Cooperative Association's (EECA) assistance in securing a \$360,000, zero-interest, 10-year loan for Degognia-Fountain Bluff Levee & Drainage District. This loan is from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Rural Economic Development Loan and Grant (REDLG) program with \$300,000 of these funds from the USDA and \$60,000 matched by EECA.

"It has always been important for Egyptian Electric to invest in rural communities," said General Manager

Shane Hermetz. "The cooperative is happy to provide support through the REDLG program."

The levee district will utilize the funds from this loan to repair and replace two of the existing pump systems. "The current pumps are 40-plus years old and were never designed to do what the district needs to remove water from areas that are at high risk for flooding," said Mark Holt, commissioner for Degognia-Fountain Bluff.

According to Holt, there will be about 12,000 acres protected by these pumps. Flood events that occurred in 2011-2012 caused a net

income loss of more than \$19 million. "Needless to say, the impact for the area will be dramatic," Holt said.

The Degognia-Fountain Bluff Levee & Drainage District is responsible for the repair and maintenance of the levee system from Cora City to Fountain Bluff on the Mississippi River and Oakwood Bottoms to Grimsby on the Big Muddy River.

"The district is playing catch-up for a system that was built in the 1950s that has had little to no maintenance since its construction," Holt said.

"Many assume that the repairs would be the responsibility of the Army Corps of Engineers, but nothing could be further from the truth. The levee district must assume that role, which is our purpose, and funding such as that provided by the loan through EECA and USDA will help facilitate that effort."

This is the first REDLG loan EECA has assisted in attaining, and the cooperative is currently accepting applicants from qualified member or non-member taxing entities within its service territory interested in the REDLG program. USDA Rural Development provides loans and grants to help expand economic opportunities and create jobs in rural areas. The scholarship program prospered under the leadership of Earl W. Struck, who served as President/CEO of the AIEC from 1994 to his retirement in 2006. Struck passed away in August 2007. The AIEC board of directors unanimously voted to honor Struck's memory by naming the annual scholarship awarded to the son or daughter of an electric cooperative employee or director the "Earl W. Struck Memorial Scholarship."

It is one of 10 scholarships awarded yearly. There were 275 applications submitted this year from the 24 Illinois electric cooperatives.

Scholarships are awarded based on grade point average, college entrance test scores, work and volunteer experience, participation in school and community activities, biographical statement and knowledge of electric cooperatives, as demonstrated by a short essay.
